William M. Tugman offers year-round camping and a scenic freshwater lake—and Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area is right next door.

Year-round Camping

- 93 electrical sites with water
- 16 yurts (8 pet-friendly – A, B, K, L, M, N, O and P)
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire rings at all sites
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Hiker/biker camp
- RV dump station

Universal Access

Two campsites (B28 and B30) and 14 yurts are accessible according to the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Yurts

A yurt is a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, and a lockable wooden door. It has lights, heating, electrical outlets and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are permitted in the pet-friendly facilities for an additional fee.

Room to Play

Tugman's day-use area features broad green lawns, a swimming-friendly beach and plenty of space for groups. A gazebo-style reservable picnic shelter is perfect for family reunions and company picnics. The day-use area also features a large off-leash exercise area for your dog to enjoy.

Eel Lake

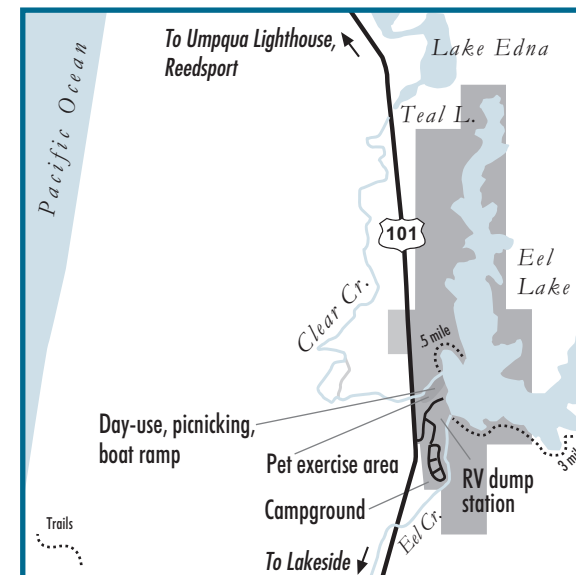
Forest-ringed Eel Lake is one of a chain of freshwater jewels just east of the coastline. Its waters are perfect for fishing, swimming, canoeing, kayaking, sailing, and boating (please respect the 10 mph speed limit).

Park facilities include a boat ramp and fishing dock modified for use by anglers with disabilities. Fish for bass and rainbow trout from the dock or your boat. The lake also has crappie, steelhead, and catch-and-release coho salmon.

You can help local Salmon and Trout Enhancement Program volunteers by counting coho salmon and steelhead that pass through fish traps on their way upstream to spawn and catching some for the hatchery.

Two in/out trails, 3-mi south trail and 1/2-mi north trail, wind around the edge of Eel Lake. Look for osprey, crane, eagle, deer, and other forest animals as you walk through stands of spruce, cedar, fir and alder.

Smoking in Oregon State Parks is allowed only in personal vehicles, RVs, campsites and portions of day use parks along state highways that are designated as safety rest areas by the Oregon Department of Transportation.

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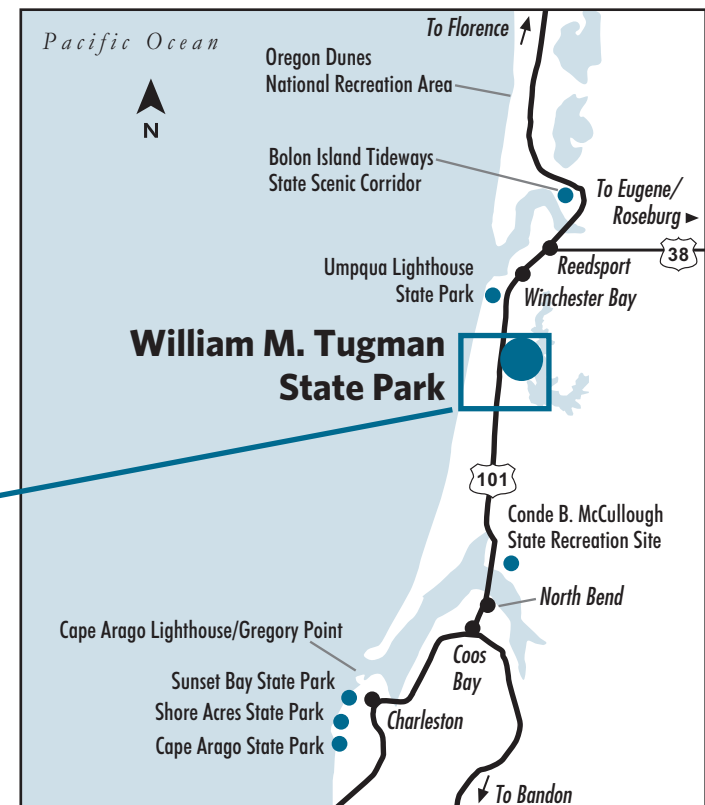
What's Nearby

Winchester Bay, six miles to the north, offers year-round crabbing, fishing, whale watching, shopping, and dining.

Umpqua River Lighthouse was the first lighthouse commissioned on the Oregon Coast. Originally built on the north spit of the Umpqua River in 1857, it was destroyed just four years later by a severe storm. Today's lighthouse has a 65-foot tower and sits on the south side of Winchester Bay. The lighthouse and museum are maintained by the Douglas County Parks and Recreation Department. Tours run year-round. Call 541-271-4631.

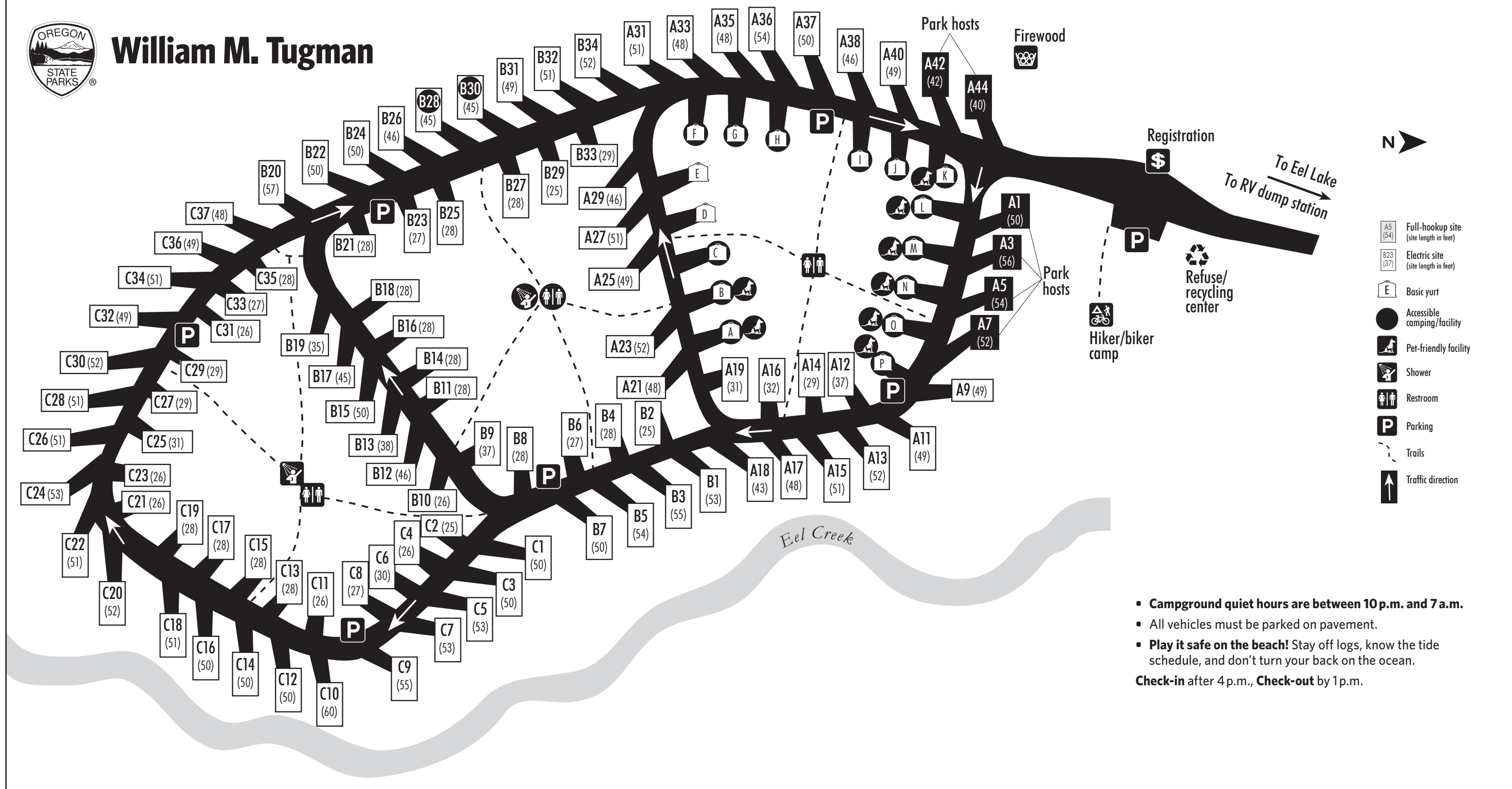
Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area

The park is situated within a 47-mile stretch of dunes from Florence to Coos Bay. While famous for OHV riding opportunities, the dunes also offer hiking, paddling, wildlife viewing, picnicking, sand play and beach access.





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- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
